## BILL HISTORY

The inadequacy of minority representation at UCB has been an unending issue for many UCSU members. Although the topic has been discussed many times, no real solutions have been offered from this body to date. The Board of Regents themselves have failed to implement workable solutions. In fact, according to a recent Colorado Daily article, Regent Sandy F. Kraemer said he was dismayed at the lack of interest in the topic. The article notes there is a "nationally shrinking 'pool' of minority students" and that "nailing down what is to be done has been difficult."

Similarly, other members of the media have recognized that the percentage of minority students is not proportionate to their percentage of the population in Colorado. Moreover, the Executive Director for the Colorado Commission on Higher Education, Blenda Wilson, has been quoted as saying these numbers reflect national trends.

In order to combat this absurd atrocity, many activities and events have been and are being planned to meet this issue directly. One such event, organized by the Career Development advisory Council, is the Minority Career Conference. This will be the fifth year of the Conference, and the second year UCSU will have the opportunity to participate.

Many sponsors of the Conference believe one of the main goals of the Conference will be to provide appropriate career planning and development opportunities for minority high school and college students in the State of Colorado. The Conference is also designed to present professional minority role models in many different academic and professional career fields for the specific purpose of increasing minority participation in such areas.

The sponsors of this bill are asking for funds to cover the costs of the Conference. Specifically, the money will be used to print 1,000 brochures outlining the Conference, the Career Development Advisory Council, and UCSU. In addition, funds are requested to print 500 copies of The Harrington-O'Shea Career Decision Making System booklet. This is a survey booklet designed to explore potential career opportunities. The brochures and the booklets will be distributed to attendees of the conference, high school students and faculty during visitations, and, if possible, at similar conferences around the country.

#### **BILL HISTORY**

During Executive Council Session 21, UCSU Executive Council passed a resolution condemning apartheid in South Africa and supporting Universities' attempts to divest funds from banks and corporations doing business in South Africa. Currently the University of Colorado has substantial investment in the above mentioned funds; therefore, South Africa and the issues surrounding are directly tied to students since their tuition dollars are invested in South Africa.

## **BILL SUMMARY**



Students applying for UCSU positions should not be required to submit their grade point averages (GPA) for consideration by the interviewing boards. In those "appropriate" cases, interviewers may choose to verbally request GPA information. It should always be requested in the form of an option.

An understanding of background, activity level and other variables are necessary to fully evaluate GPAs appropriately. UCSU's time constraints do not always allow for such scrutiny.

GPA does not predetermine success or dedication. Indeed, this information would be better provided through more direct questioning. Students should not be embarrassed to submit their applications for consideration by fellow students.

## **BILL HISTORY**

This Bill is submitted in response to considerable Council and public debate on this matter. This action was mandated by 22 ECB #4, passed 11/15/84, 10-2-0. UCSU crosses the boundaries or territory of student groups and therefore must, by definition, favor one group's ideology over another when they support its specific political agenda. UCSU alienates the student groups and a large portion of the student body that support a different political view when we do this.

#### BILL SUMMARY

Establishes policy on the role of UCSU in political questions that do not directly affect UCSU's operations or higher education.

## BE IT ENACTED by the Executive Council of the University of Colorado Student Union, THAT:

form of a resolution.)

**SECTION 2:** Neutral is defined as not addressing foreign or domestic policy,

> labor/management disputes and political candidates or officials and their views. (Example: A resolution to support Ronald

Reagan in his efforts to reverse affirmative action).

SECTION 3: It is the role of student groups to address these issues

independently with the financial support of the Student

Organizations Committee.

SECTION 4: UCSU shall make every attempt to fund or encourage speakers

and other eductional media, in an unbiased, equal and

representative fashion.

SECTION 5: Any legislation which may breach this Bill shall be submitted to

Rules Committee for approval before being placed on the agenda.

Approval shall be granted on the basis of this Bill only.

SECTION 6: This legislation takes effect upon passage.

## BILL HISTORY

During the spring semester of 1985 UCSU voted to allocate money to help pay for Mr. John Stockwell to come to campus to speak on the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). This legislation was co-sponsored by Tim Rustow and Jill Hanauer. Over 400 people attended this event.

#### **BILL SUMMARY**

This Bill shall allocate \$500 from Executive Council Reserve for an honorarium for Mr. David MacMichael, a former CIA official who was commissioned by the CIA to expose the arms flow from Nicaragua to El Salvador. MacMichael charges that at no time during his term with the National Intelligence Council (branch of the CIA) did he see convincing raw or finished evidence that indicated the existence of a significant arms flow from Nicaragua after the spring of 1981. MacMichael has just returned from the United Nations World Court at the Hague in the Netherlands in regards to the CIA's activities in Nicaragua, including the mining of the Nicaraguan harbor.

## BE IT ENACTED by the Executive Council of the University of Colorado Student Union, THAT:

SECTION 1:

UCSU Executive Council shall allocate \$500 from Executive Council Reserve to go towards an honorarium for Mr. David MacMichael, who will speak at CU on November 15 at 7 p.m. in the Balch Fieldhouse.
