BILL HISTORY

The CU Environmental Center, in conjunction with the Kuja Sni Research Group, a non-profit organization, is hosting a Rainforest Convention February 5-8, 1987. Many noted speakers, such as David Brower, Norman Myers, and Ghillean Prance, from a wide variety of organizations and interests, will be flying to CU to attend the event.

The convention will provide an opportunity for students and community members to learn more about the deforestation of the world's major rainforests. CU Boulder faculty will play a major role in the presentations and one goal of the convention is to continue outreach to students after the actual event through the Environmental Center and related organizations. The cost will be \$35 for nonstudents; students get in free.
