BILL HISTORY

Historically the UMC Board has questioned the Graduate Student Advisory Council (GSAC) attendance at posted office hours. In the past this has usually been resolved by presenting explanations regarding the GSAC's position within the UCSU government. However, this year these explanations have falled upon deaf ears and it has been decided that the GSAC will have to vacte their office as of December 8, 1989.

BILL SUMMARY

This bill request the Legilative Council overturn the UMC Board's decision to relocate the GSAC's offce to UMC 301.

This request is based upon the fact that the UMC Board has not followed correct eviciotn procedure. The GSAC also feels that the line of questioning during the UMC Board's reallocation hearing was irrelevant and hinted of a possible witch hunt. Since this move is estimated to cost the GSAC a minimum of \$200, which it can ill afford, it is not a trivial matter.

The GSAC is an autonomous local school and not a student group. The UMC Board has violated section B.5.A of its Room Allocations Attachment B. The GSAC historically has had a problem with the UMC Board on this issue.

BE IT ENACTED by the Legislative Council of the University of Colorado Student Union, THAT:

SECTION 1: The GSAC be allowed "exception status" to the UMC Board's posted office hours policy.

SECTION 2: The GSAC be allowed to retain its current office until UMC Board Fall Room Allocations decisions.

SECTION 3: This bill will take effect upon passage.
