



As a new student group we feel our first conference was a success. Everything went off without a hitch - no problems whatsoever. Our Friday night event drew about 200 people. We feel this was a good turnout considering the fact that none of our speakers were well known. We also received alot of compliments on our mix of speakers and music and poetry that evening. The subject matter was controversial, political prisoners in the U.S. and people of color in the prison system, because many people don't realize that we do indeed have political prisoners here in the U.S. (hence, the purpose of the conference). I was approached by many Friday night who thanked me for organizing the event because they had learned a great deal. There were students, faculty, a few attorneys and community members in attendance. Saturday's attendance was more than expected. It was the first nice day (upper 60's) in a while, there were also alot of other very important things going on around campus and yet at least 100 people showed up for the workshops! The forum that ended the two-day conference was an opportunity for attendees to ask questions of the participants. The dialogue that ensued was, I feel, one of the most positive aspects of the conference.

The only thing I will do different next year is to incorporate more issues. We ended up this year focusing mostly on political prisoners and one in particular, Leonard Peltier, and only touched on people of color in the prison system. I hope to have a more balanced platform next year.

All in all, I feel the Equal Justice conference was a great success and look forward to organizing next year's.
