A BILL

BILL HISTORY

On March 25-29, 1992, the National Association for Chicano Studies (NACS) will be holding its 20th anniversary conference in San Antonio, Texas. The conference seeks to train students in the techniques of social change through multicultural education. In addition, the students will learn from past and present leaders on the necessity for diversity in this society. The conference will provide over 70 panels with leading scholars and practitioners imparting their knowledge and current research on a variety of topics; bilingual education, redistricting/reapportionment, strategies for social change, etc.

CU students from the Student Leadership Institute on Diversity (SLID) will learn about the many different Latino cultures and specific techniques for managing social protest. SLID is a group consisting of representatives from UCSU, Black Student Alliance, Asian-Pacific American Coalition, United Mexican-American Students, Oyate, Ethnic Women's Alliance, Panhellenic Council, Interfraternity Council, Minority Graduate Student Association, and Korean Student Association.

With the push for multiculturalism in this society, the University of Colorado at Boulder can benefit from the training that UCSU can provide student organizations and the campus-at-large. This training will enhance student awareness for diversity and provide techniques that will allow students to voice their issues effectively.

BILL SUMMARY





Re: National Association for Chicano Studies Conference

The Student Leadership Institute on Diversity (SLID) would like to thank UCSU for allotting us funds to take some of its members to the NACS conference in San Antonio from March 24-29. The conference proved to be highly educational and informational. SLID members had the opportunity to learn about many of the issues facing Mexican-American people and their communities.

Most of the agenda consisted of sessions conducted by highly respected individuals.
