BILL HISTORY

ENALDS (European North American Leadership Development Seminar) is AIESEC's premier leadership and management development seminar for the EUNO region. This conference is attended by approximately 300 new members of the association from 30 representative countries. This conference takes place once a year in the spring. ENALDS is an opportunity for new members to gain international experience to build their leadership and management skills for future global organizations.

ENALDS 1992 will be held in Izmir, Turkey from March 31 - April 6, 1992. I have been selected by AIESEC International as one of 15 individuals, from the 30 countries, to train at this international event. I am very honored to have been selected to the team of trainers and look forward to providing motivation and training to the young up-and-coming leaders of this organization. As a trainer, I am required to be in Izmir March 28th for pre-conference preparation.

BILL SUMMARY





ENALDS 1992

ENALDS (European North American Leadership Development Seminar) was held in Cesme, Turkey March 28 - April 6. There was a total of 283 delegates from 31 countries in attendance, as well as 20 trainers.

The focus of the conference was on training the up-and-coming leaders of AIESEC. The event consisted of large sessions on the global environment both inside and outside AIESEC. In addition, there were small workshop sessions in: time management, how to train, human resource management, external relations, and others.

The entire delegation was broken into groups of 15-20 for training rotations, as well as for discussion sake. There were sessions devoted to talking about cultural differences, world issues and how AIESEC can play apart in addressing the issues, and time was devoted to talking about the individuals different countries.

One half-day was spent on an excursion to Ephesus, a famous place which was at one time a part of the Turkish empire. There was also time for delegates to exchange t-shirts and paraphernalia from their countries.

The event was an amazing success. The goals outlined by the delegates and trainers at the beginning of the meeting were met by the end of the week. Personally, I have received three letters from delegates who learned a lot and grew individually from their experience at ENALDS.

He not only was stuck without a place to go, but also no way to get there. To make the matter worse, he called home to find out four of his friends had just been killed in the fighting.

There I was worrying about \$700, when my friend had just lost four friends and had no idea when and how he would get home. This was a reality shock in more than one way. I realize that the U.S. is not a perfect place, but at least I knew I could get home and my friends would be there.

Take time to look around you and see what you have. Be thankful. If you see things you don't like, don't just complain about it. Get off your butt and CHANGE IT. Become a part of the solution, don't sit back and be the apathetic American.
